Register to be a donor on your iPhone

Apple® and Donate Life America (DLA) have brought the donor registration process to your fingertips. The release of iOS 10 allows iPhone users to register their decision to be an organ, eye and tissue donor directly in the Medical ID tab within the iPhone Health app.Through a simple signup process, iPhone users

can learn more and take action with just a

few taps. All registrations submitted from iPhone are sent directly to the National Donate Life Registry, managed by DLA.

The National Donate Life Registry is a separate registry from the state-wide Minnesota database of registered donors.

Kyle Gasteyer - Donor

Kyle Gasteyer was a young man, just 24 years old, who saw the possibilities in a piece of wood.

He was a woodworker, a carpenter, who already owned a house and acreage. Kyle saw the potential in a country home, the possibility in good land and a homestead. He understood that with a strong work ethic, family values, and a helping hand extended to his fellow man, he could do good things in this world.

Diane and Jeff Gasteyer were proud of their son, and his sister, Brooke, looked up to him. He was the kind of kid who befriended anyone and helped them with his easy friendship and warm heart. Potential and possibilities—even in his childhood friendships, Kyle saw the goodness of what could be, if you just worked hard enough.


At 24 years old, a tragic car accident ended Kyle's young life, so full of potential and possibilities.

They have connected with some of Kyle's recipients, and they marvel at the potential, the possibility, the life and hope their son gave these complete strangers.

At 24, Kyle's adult life was just beginning. An accident brought that life to an end. Yet, Kyle's belief in the potential, the possibility, the goodness of life was continued—through his legacy as a donor.
